Introduction from new SOS Chair Paul Khan



My name is Paul Khan and I have been given the privilege and honour to take on the role of chair of SOS.

In the first instance, I would like to thank the outgoing chair, Joe Blott and his vice chair Graham Smith for the outstanding work they have done over the years in very difficult circumstances. Times

were not 'normal' during their tenure, having to respond to Covid, the Super League debacle and the near tragedy in Paris.

I also recognise the great work of the previous chairs – the late great Paul Rice, Fran Stanton and Jay Mckenna and thank them for getting SOS into the position it is currently in.

I realise these are big boots to fill. However, we are fortunate to have a great new vice chair in Peter Hooton and a fantastic and committed management committee who work hard to support our members. Please remember that all of the committee give up our time for free.

I was fortunate to be sent a video of a speech made on the SOS coach coming home after the final match of the season at Southampton that focused on the unbelievable work done since Paris.

The union helped gain an apology from UEFA and the Premier League and all ticket holders who purchased tickets from LFC were given a refund.

It made me think of the power of the union and that our vision moving forward must be to become the 'biggest, strongest, most effective fan union in the world'. With your support, we can achieve this ambitious aim.

A lot of people don't know me so I'll give a very brief introduction. I was born and brought up just off Anfield Road, a couple of streets from the ground. I attended all my schools in Anfield – infants, juniors and comprehensive. I have been a Kop season ticket holder for 40 years and been there both in the glory days and the tragic days. I have held a number of director positions in the public and private sectors and a chair position at the Greenhouse Project Educational charity based in Toxteth.

I was fortunate to be able to take early retirement and decided to dedicate my life to helping others who need it most. I was asked to become a member of the Fans Supporting Foodbanks management committee, which runs six pantries across the city providing much-needed food for people during this dreadful cost of living crisis.

I personally organise and volunteer at the SOS-funded pantry which is delivered in partnership with FSF and the Greenhouse Project. My work previously with SOS has been centred mainly on community-based projects.

To the future and ways of working. I believe in both inclusion and autonomy – words that may seem to be at odds with each other, but they don't have to be. In terms of autonomy, we attended a management away day recently, discussing all the various dealings we have with the club and decided it would be good to create groups that can focus on specific areas. There are 15 groups, which demonstrates both the operational and strategic challenges the union face.

The groups are: Ticketing, Club Strategy, Advisory, Planning, Organisation, Community, Media, Partnerships, Supporters Board, Technical, Travel, Equality and Diversity, Marketing, Executive and Finance.

This brings me to inclusivity. We need to engage with SOS members on a more regular basis and we need to understand what is important to you.

As a first step, we will send a presentation to every member detailing the responsibilities of each group and ask you to vote on what you believe are the top three priorities. This will enable the management committee to direct key resources to these priority areas.

Each group leader has agreed to select the people in their group who can assist them the most – this will involve both current and former committee members who have specific expertise to add value and knowledge. They will produce a short one-page document detailing what they hope to achieve over the coming year and we will share these with you so there is full transparency.

SOS was set up as a campaigning organisation and it remains so. Some people have asked whether we are a friend or foe to the club? The position is that we will always engage with the club, listen and take a view, and if action is required we will consult the management committee and members.

As my friend Dave Kelly, chair of Fans Supporting Foodbanks says, it is better to "jaw, jaw than war, war". Hopefully, we will always arrive at a sensible resolution for both the club and supporters.

I have tried to condense a lot of information into a small message on these pages. I have also recorded a video message that will provide more detail and hopefully answer the questions sent in by members.

Greenhouse Project Mobile Pantry


